

NEW CHAIR ORDER

Since the order was placed and paid for 100 chairs in April 2023, the company involved, Rosehill Furniture, have failed to deliver the goods. The matter has now been in the hands of the Law department of the Church of Scotland for some time and below is a copy extract from their latest communication with the company.

"We require in writing within the next 14 days – on or before Friday 1 March – the date by which you promise to make delivery. This requires to come with an undertaking that should it not be met then a refund will be provided in full.


This promised delivery date should be by the end of April. If this is something you cannot manage then please just immediately cancel and refund our clients' order.

Our clients have instructed us to set out these firm deadlines as a final opportunity to you. Should you fail to meet any of these deadlines then I am instructed to issue a notice of cancellation and to raise court proceedings for payment of the sums paid."



Upper Annandale Parish Church

Year ended 31 December 2023

The year to 31 December 2023 has been a momentous year for Upper Annadale Parish Church as it marked two historic events. Firstly this year saw the formation of Upper Annadale Parish Church through the union of Moffat St Andrew's Parish Church with the congregations of Kirkpatrick Juxta, Johnstonebridge and Wamphray Parish Churches to form the united parish of Upper Annandale Parish Church.

Secondly the year saw the completion of the major project to redevelop the building of t Andrew's Moffat to create a multi-purpose space for use in worship and for wider community purposes. This project has been successfully delivered by the main Contractors, Brick & Steel Construction Ltd under the supervision of Scott Wham Architects Ltd . on time and on budget, As previously reported the building element of the project cost £580,038+VAT an enormous sum funded by over £200,000 in grants, the legacy provided by the late David Campbell together with the donations and fund-raising efforts of Members and friends. Apart from the main building project the major items of relate to audio visual equipment which is being funded by grant of £12,000 and access to an unsecured interest -free loan where we have drawn-down £50,000 of the £100,000 offered.

In financial terms the draft Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2023 show an income for the parish of Upper Annanm donations increased to £6/dale combined for the latter four months of 2023 of £80,803 with expenditure of £80803 giving a modest surplus of £2708 before adjustments. Our income from donations increased to £54,512 from £53,031 the previous year but income from property rental income decreased due to the Church buildings being closed for renovation.

At the year end we retain our investment in the property at Olrig in Moffat which continues to generate a reliable income of £6,600 per year and bank balances of £92661.

Since the rededication and reopening of the Church building in August 2023 we have seen the building starting to be used as we had hoped for Worship, and wider community use for example the Christmas Tree Festival, concerts-

for instance the Hungarian Café Orchestra, the Dumfries Male Voice Choir a Ladies Comedy Night etc with plans for many more in the coming year.

It is too soon to be able to quantify the financial impact of the renovations but we can face the future with confidence in being able to provide a splendid location for future Worship and facilities for the many and varied needs of the whole community.

We continue to rely on the generosity and support of our members and friends for all their efforts we give thanks as we go forward into 2024 in our renovated building and a combined parish of Upper Annadale

The move of Father Jim last year, from St Lukes here in Moffat to a new position in Ayrshire, was quite a blow for the ACTs community; as convener of the group his commitment to, and belief in the value of, the work of ACTs was a powerful factor in encouraging the churches in our area to work together in a spirit of ecumenism, particularly at key points in the Christian calendar.

Fr Jim's is a hard act to follow, and I can say this with some authority as it has fallen to me (by default, it must be stressed) to take on the convenership of ACTs in his place. What has struck me from the outset is just what a nice group of folk make up this community, and how willing everybody is to play a part in ensuring that the work of ACTs goes on.

Hopefully some readers will have enjoyed our Advent activities leading up to Christmas, and the Agape Supper late in January; and now our thoughts are focused on Lent and the approach to Easter.

We have taken as the theme for this year's series of Lent Talks, "The Death and Resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ"; these weekly evening talks have customarily been hosted by our friends at St Johns, with each evening being led by a different church or community. The evenings are very informal, and for some folk have been a 'gateway' into the ACTs community, should they feel drawn to this.

The programme of evenings has been displayed on the screen in church, and also in the entrance lobby of the church; by the time you read this, the February talks will already have happened, but for March the Tuesday evenings are, 5th (St Lukes), 12th (UAPC), and 19th (Sunday Night Live); all at St Johns, and all from 7 - 8.30pm.

As Easter itself draws near there are other events which have for years now been a part of Moffat life in the spring. On Sunday 24th, at 6.30pm, we have an ecumenical Palm Sunday service at UAPC, which we're hoping will be led by Rev Paul Singh, of St Johns, and which will include a reflection by Rev Alison McBrier, Moderator of the Southwest Presbytery; we had hoped to welcome her to our Agape Supper back in January, but the storms that evening prevented her from travelling. Hopefully the weather will be kinder at the end of March!

On Friday 29th, Good Friday, we have our annual "Walk of Witness", led by the Cross and visiting the various Moffat churches; this begins at "The Boat", next to the Station Park bridge, at 8.50am, and finishes with refreshments at St Johns church hall.

Finally, on Easter Sunday morning, the 31st, we gather for an open air service at the Station Park Pavilion at 7am; do remember, by the way, that this is the very night that the clocks change, so we gather for 7am British Summer Time! This service will be led by Andy Shuttleworth, with Gillian Henson as ever providing the music on her keyboard; at the end of the service we repair to St Johns, for bacon rolls and a hot drink.

May I, on behalf of Annandale Churches Together, wish you all a blessed Easter season.

Every year I think it will be different but of course it never seems to change, with Christmas and Easter running into one another in what appears to be no time at all. This is of course, a sign of a busy church and it seems to be getting busier each year.

The final service was held in Kirkpatrick Juxta church on 31 December 2023 and the church was filled to capacity downstairs with some people also upstairs. Fitting tributes to the history and life of the church were given by Peter Newsome and Andy Shuttleworth with the service being led by Rev Elsie. This resulted in a very moving and poignant service which was complemented with a beautiful Baptism. KJ church will be sadly missed but we are pleased that UAPC is now benefiting from their regular attenders coming to Moffat and integrating into church life here. We in the Kirk session appreciate their help and input as our church goes forward.

A successful mandatory Safeguarding training course for Trustees (the new name for elders) was held on 31 January 2024 with most trustees attending.

Elders Retiring; Sir Neil McIntosh, James Buchanan and Margaret Buchanan have announced their retirement from eldership. We extend our sincere thanks and gratitude for their long and faithful service to our Lord and our church.

Installation of the Audio/Visual equipment is now almost complete with the projector and camera system in weekly use. This is proving to be very successful and useful and seems to give a different dimension to the services. Session is very grateful for the skills and dedication given by the volunteers who operate this technology.

The heating system has still got one or two issues with the timing controller, which was not helped by the two recent power cuts/surges. The net result of this is that the controller is going to be replaced with a new one which we hope will prove to be more reliable in future use. The system is much more efficient resulting in a better heat delivery and retention in both the hall and the church but with the doubling of energy costs in the last two years we continue to struggle with the cost of heating as a KWh of electricity costs 28p compared with a KWh of gas at 7p. This seems totally incongruous with the aim of becoming a low carbon usage institution and Country.

It is gratifying to report that the demand for using the hall and the church continues to increase with activities such as Drop-in, toddlers group, Pilates, yoga, Slimming class, exercise for the elderly, painting and craft groups. Reservations for the church include meetings for Concerts, Scottish tourism, Eagle Festival presentation, and bookings for dances and receptions.

As we proceed towards Easter with its special services we remember the core focus of our church as Lord Jesus Christ, by whose Grace we venture forth.

Presbytery Report

Over the winter months the amount of business dealt with by presbytery has been significant, as would be expected for such a large presbytery and at such times as these. A great amount of work has been done and continues to be done regarding the former presbytery plans, now incorporated into the presbytery plan for the South West.

I think every meeting I have attended has involved reports and/or representations on the closure, linkage or union of churches, with representations made by ministers, elders or members of the congregation regarding their own respective set of circumstances. While Presbytery attempts to deal with all cases fairly and compassionately, there has been much heartache expressed by those speaking about what the loss of their places of worship over many years will mean to individuals, congregations and communities.

The Presbytery of the South West has determined that it will be a 'mission focussed' presbytery and, to that end, the Missionary Convener, the Rev Gavin Niven has been very active in presenting ways that churches can develop and promote mission locally. During the Presbytery meeting of 5th December, he drew attention to a key part of mission for the church- the creation of new worshipping communities.

The Church of Scotland has set up the £25 million Seeds for Growth Fund which supports projects aimed at church growth, reaching out to people who do not belong to an existing church, with particular emphasis on church planting.

Over a seven-year period, Seeds for Growth will award grants to support:

- · The planting of new worshipping communities
- · Work focused on the development of new forms and fresh expressions of church life
- · Creative engagement with all sectors of society, in particular with those aged 40 and under, in every case promoting the advancement of religion and the overarching purpose of the numerical and spiritual growth of the Church
- · Community transformation motivated by Christian service.

Over the initial three years (2023–2026), the fund will prioritise the support of:

- · The planting of new worshipping communities
- · Work with people aged 40 and under.

Gavin described the first two phases of creating worshipping communities, namely the identification of 'pioneer initiatives' and thereafter the process of training ministry teams as part of the development of learning communities. Further information on this topic is available from presbytery.

A significant item of business has been consideration of the Faith Overture for Presbyteries, proposed by the Theological Forum of the Church of Scotland and the proposals for change currently being debated by presbyteries.

The proposal centres around the Westminster Confession of Faith which is given special place in the Church of Scotland. The proposal is that its place should be taken by a book of five statements of faith (one of which will continue to be the Westminster Confession).

This was brought to the November Kirk Session Meeting at U.A.P.C. where, after a brief discussion and vote, I was advised to vote in favour of the overture. The item was made the 'order of the day' at the Presbytery meeting on 5th December and, after debate a vote was taken at which 54% of those attending voted in favour of the motion proposing the overture and 46% voted against. This process is being repeated in presbyteries around Scotland and the results will be collated at this year's General Assembly. If the overall vote is in favour of the overture, the process will be repeated (i.e. we will discuss and vote on this proposed change again later this year for presentation at the next General Assembly); if the vote is against the overture at this year's Assembly, the overture fails and will not be reconsidered.

It is quite a complex subject so the Theological Forum have produced a useful video which is available on YouTube. It features Rev Dr Alasdair MacLeod and the link is: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7 YkZfCWLuU

I am conscious of the amount of business going on at presbytery and the limits what can be shared in this report. To that end I have contacted the Presbytery Clerk's office to enquire if there is a means of people gaining access to papers etc. At the moment the Presbytery has a Facebook page a website is under construction. When this is completed it is intended that documents will be available for all to peruse. WHO DO YOU THINK YOU ARE?

A couple of Sundays ago I was collared by Elsie just as I was leaving the church. She wanted me to meet a gentleman, Billy, who had visited UAPC and was trying to find out a bit more about his grandparents who had lived and worked in the area. He had a copy of the details from when they were married at Kirkpatrick Juxta Church in 1904 and that they had lived in the 'Station House' in Beattock. I was able to show him the house and take him into the church. Sadly he has no pictures of either his grandmother or grandfather and has no idea what his grandmother looked like as she died when he was very young. But as he stood in front of the chancel where his grandparents would have proclaimed their vows, he was visibly moved. "This is a real 'Who do you think you are?' moment," he said.

He was, of course, referring to the popular TV programme where, in each episode, a celebrity investigates their family tree and discovers sometimes amazing things about their heritage. It is certainly a very enjoyable and often informative programme and has perhaps contributed to the current rise in enthusiasm for people digging into their past and uncovering their own family trees. But, as an old cynic, I am reminded of the dangers of following only those branches of the tree which appeal to us. After all, while we all have one biological mother and father we have two sets of grandparents, four sets of great grandparents and eight sets of great-great grandparents. I suspect it is always tempting to quote our heritage as being from the line that gives us the best tartan or the link to some great artist, rather than the one which shows us to be a descendent of a sheep stealer or embezzler.

My own daughter (bless her) discovered that, through an ancient Irish ancestor on her mother's side of the family, she was if fact a distant (a very distant) relative of the late Queen Elizabeth II. This was a fact she delighted in reminding me of on a fairly regular basis, pointing out that I had no royal blood at all. Sadly, this treasured relationship proved fruitless and resulted in her being, to use her own words, "Pure ragin'!" when she didn't receive an invite to either Prince William or Prince Harry's weddings.

Who we are, where we came from, what we used to do is generally important to us- it helps us to define who we are in the here and now. For some people it is more important than for others and some can find it challenging when they have to let go of their past, especially when that includes the trappings of power and achievement.

In Genesis chapter 12, when God spoke to Abram about the plans He had laid out for him, there was no reference to Abram's past or his heritage; when Jesus spoke to the Samaritan woman at the well He stunned her with His knowledge of her past, but it was the here and now and what was to come that he emphasised. What she had been didn't matter- it was what he promised her was to come that changed her life. Again, when He met Zaccheus, despite the reaction of many in the crowd, Jesus seemed to take little interest in the person Zaccheus had been. For Him, it was the potential and the future of this wee man that was important.

Here in Moffat, the Community Council has taken on the task of creating our very own 'Plan'.

This is being based on previous extensive consultations in the Community, which created an Access Plan, and a Community Action Plan. Although these were widely consulted on, these Plans did not carry the 'official' recognition of a 'Place Plan', which has a new and specific role in Local Authority planning processes.

Based on these extensively discussed starting points, there have already been numerous meetings with local groups involved during early 2024 to build up a picture of aspirations that is as inclusive as possible of everyone's views and desires for our future. The draft plan that's been created so far, talks of Moffat retaining its essential character, remaining a destination point for Visitors and Tourists, protecting both the local architecture and the beautiful scenery that surrounds us. It talks of an ecologically sensitive community, minimising waste and optimising the countryside for agriculture and recreation.

This Place Plan will continue to evolve over Spring and Summer 2024, with all of Moffat's Community groups invited to contribute to its development, and then when we have a 'final' draft it will then be published for full public consultation in our community, probably in early autumn of this year.

We may not be able to achieve 100% agreement on every single issue the Place Place refers to, Community don't work that way, but so far there has been near total unanimity on the draft as it has evolved.

When we are as happy as we can be that the Place Plan describes what the Community 'wants' over the next 5 years and beyond, the Place Place will be officially lodged with Dumfries and Galloway Council, who are then required to reference it prior to any planning developments that could impact on the Plan. It will also be a support for grant funding for all those organisations whose aims coincide with the Place Plan.

This is the very first time we have tried to create a 'Place Plan', and the Community Council has involved representatives from Holyrood and Dumfries and Galloway Council to make sure we are presenting them with what they need and can recognise. Many other local communities in Dumfries and Galloway are also developing their own 'Plans'.

Greetings from the Kitega Centre, we are excited to share with you the incredible impact your support has had in 2023.

This being our 25th anniversary we are amazed how far we have come from a few children with disabilities gathering

together under a tree to what we have today

Your partnership and generosity have paved the way for numerous achievements and empowered community members to live sustainably. We are thrilled to share some key highlights of this impact:

Support for Children with Disabilities: Thanks to your support, over 40 children with disabilities have received special support resulting in increased independence and improved social skills. Three of these children have even started running their own small businesses, showcasing their potential and applicability of the lessons learned at the Centre. We are also preparing to graduate at least three more children to follow the same path in 2024.

Education for Vulnerable Children: Your support has made it possible for more than 300 vulnerable children to access education. Through scholastic materials and project porridge incentives, these children not only have access to education but also experience the joy of learning and achieve academic success. Project Porridge has improved overall health and concentration of the pupils as they attend school.

Community Empowerment: We have empowered and equipped over 300 community members with sustainable living skills through VICOBA Plus. There has been a general improvement in livelihoods for instance in 60 homes that we managed to visit, family incomes have increased by 5%, enhancing the economic well-being of individuals and households. Furthermore, more than 40 new businesses have been established, and have survived for more than six months fostering local economic growth and promoting entrepreneurship.

VICOBA plus is an engine for personal transformation that inspires individuals to utilise available resources for better. It empowers those who feel stuck with a mindset of "I can" and cultivates community that believes "Yes we can".

Replication of Training: The success of the VICOBA Plus training programs provided by the Kitega Community Centre has sparked interest from other communities in the region - Rwanda, DRC, Burundi, Tanzania, and Kenya. The model is an effective tool for personal and community transformation; working with different regional leaders with the support of African Road Inc we have replicated the model to help communities address their own community needs.

We have been able to provide training and mentorship to over 300 individuals across the region who are actively implementing the model in their own context.

Our work has gone beyond Kitega and Uganda and has also created a ripple effect of positive change across the East African Region.

Legal Aid: Through the legal Aid project, the Kitega Centre has been able to provide legal aid to community members, assisting them in navigating the legal system. Over 50 individuals have received legal advice, enabling them to protect their rights effectively. We are proud to share that five cases have received positive rulings, ensuring access to justice for community members.

Katungulu Community Hospital: The construction of the community hospital has generated excitement and anticipation within the community. This special healthcare facility, made possible by your support, will soon open its doors, providing essential healthcare services to community members. The establishment of this hospital will significantly improve overall health outcomes and well-being.

These highlights represent just a fraction of the incredible impact of the Kitega Centre.
