
"The supporting actors were a fascinating bunch from very diverse backgrounds, all the technical staff and the wardrobe and makeup women were a scream."

TV Role for Perth Minister

A Church of Scotland minister has brushed shoulders with Hollywood

celebrities after securing a guest role in a new Apple TV period drama.

The Rev Jim Stewart, minister at Perth: Letham St Mark's made his appearance as 'The Vicar' in The Buccaneers which launched on Apple TV on November 8. The series is based on the final (and unfinished) novel by Edith Wharton and centres around a group of socially ambitious American families seeking to find a husband in Victorian Britain.

He applied after a friend tagged him on Facebook after Forge Productions (a company involved in the production) appealed for a real minister to take up the role.

Filming took place over five days at Gosford House near Aberlady, East Lothian in July 2022.

Jim explained: "As I was on holiday it seemed a fun thing to do and after a Covid test I was allowed on set to start the process of a costume fitting.

"It was incredibly hard work but utterly enjoyable.

"The location was Gosford House in East Lothian, a beautiful stately home that was perfect for the period drama - even though it was supposed to be 1870s New York.

"I played the role of the 'The Vicar.' In the end I was filmed in five separate scenes wrapped around the wedding of characters Lord Richard Marlborough and Conchita Closson. The role was originally a non-speaking part but after spending time with Susanna White, the director, she 'eased' me into speaking during the wedding ceremony. Susanna was also keen to know my opinion in how to set up the wedding ceremony.

"I know now this was quite incredible that such an experienced director would value the views of a newbie on set but as I got to know her she expertly got the absolute best out of everyone she worked with."

During the production Jim mingled with some well-known celebrities including Christina Hendricks (better known for her role in the Netflix advertising agency drama Mad Men) and Josh Dylan (who appeared in Mamma Mia 2 Here We Go Again!)

"As a complete novice to acting I had no expectations or much understanding of the protocols surrounding the principal actors. When I was with the principal actors they were generous and encouraging.

"I received warm encouragement from Christina Hendricks and Josh Dylan before my big wedding scene even though I fluffed my lines which meant a full reset before I nailed it. Simone Kirkby was especially helpful with a big hug at the end of a long day when everyone's eyes were on you!"

The major renovation project which has taken so much time and effort over the last two plus years has been completed successfully. The final cost of the building work amounted to £580,038 + VAT of which we paid £565,537 + VAT leaving a balance of

£14501 +VAT, retention monies, being payable 12 months hence.

All expenses associated with the renovation, building contract, professional fees, VAT, and replacement chairs,£764,661 in total have been funded by the late David Campbell's legacy, grants received, VAT refunds, members donations and various fund-raising events.

To maximise use of the renovated building a new Audio-Visual system is integral to the future use of the building, so we have taken the decision to proceed with the installation of audio equipment, which is almost complete. The installation of visual equipment is to follow. The cost of this equipment is forecast to be around £72,000, for which we have received grants of £12,000 and the remainder will be funded from the interest -free loan we have been offered. To date we have drawn down £50,000 from the total loan of £100,000 which has been offered.

We would anticipate that the amount of the loan utilised will be around £40,000. As reported in the previous issue of the Link the loan is repayable over a period of 12 years.

We would thank everyone who has supported the project by way of donations, sponsoring a chair, or purchasing a pew, or attending fundraising events . Special thanks have to go to Adam Anderson for his herculean work in obtaining grants of over £220,000 to support this Project.

We now have a multi -purpose building available for worship by the Congregation and use for activities in support of our wider Community

Session Clerk Report

Since my last writing, there have been a lot of changes to the structure of our church. On 1 September 2023 the Union of Johnstonebridge, Kirkpatrick Juxta (KJ), Wamphray and St Andrews, Moffat was declared as official by the Presbytery. The new church which is thus formed had to be called a name which did not bear the previous name of St Andrews, so a vote was held by Presbytery and the new name which was adopted is the Upper Annandale Parish Church.

The first service was held on the 3 September 2023 with the church being reopened in time for that date, in spite of some work still continuing. During the time of the Renovation project, the congregation of St Andrews has been worshipping in KJ church and I would like to express our most sincere thanks to the KJ congregation for their extremely warm, friendly and accommodating welcome during this time. It was a pleasure to be part of their weekly services with such fellowship in a beautiful building.

KJ church is not officially closing until 31 December 2023 but their Kirk Session decided to be part of the UAPC from the opening date of 3rd September. There will be a final service at KJ on 31 December 2023 when the other churches will be closed and it is therefore hoped that as many people who can possibly attend that iconic service, will do so.

Part of the changeover process involved a Joint Kirk Session meeting at which the old Office Bearers of St Andrew's were thanked and retired, with new Office Bearers for the UAPC appointed. This included the new position of Deputy Session Clerk which was filled by Mrs Helen Braid.

We welcome the existing elders from KJ and Wamphray to join as part of the UAPC team. Several of the senior elders of the former St Andrew's Church have taken this opportunity to retire and stand down from their duties. I extend my grateful thanks to all of these dedicated Ladies and Gentlemen who have so faithfully served our church over many, many years.

During the past few months, we are delighted to welcome three new members to our church as well as a considerable number of new people who are attending the weekly services. This is despite the element of chaos which has been inevitable in the initial weeks and months since reopening, as the new system evolves and get settled.

The main renovation contract is now virtually completed with just a few outstanding odds and ends to be done. This has taken several months longer than anticipated, which is partly due to the number of extra items which have been successfully completed. These include such things as new lighting, painting and insulation in the church hall.

We are greatly indebted to Brick and Steel Construction who have supplied and installed many extras free of charge. These include insulation in hall ceiling, the new sound desk, the storage container, water heater in the servery and hand dryers in the new toilets as well as numerous other minor items. .../cont

Presbytery Report

Presbytery met on 2nd September in the Howard Centre, Kilmarnock.

Following constitution which included a celebration of communion Presbytery heard tributes to recently deceased former members of Presbytery David Almond, Stuart Birss, Davis Chisholm and Iain Curry. There also followed commemoration of anniversaries of ordination of ministers, elders and deacons ranging from 25 years to 60 years.

Recently elected Moderator, Rev Alison McBrier, Minister at Caldwell and Dunlop, took the oath de fideli and assumed the chair for the remainder of the meeting.

The remainder of the morning was given over to presentation and discussion on Mission, led by the convener, Rev Gavin Niven. He began by reflecting on the stated aim of the Presbytery of the South West to be a 'Mission-minded Presbytery'.

There followed a recorded presentation on the challenge and change around us from the Rev Tommy MacNeil, minister of Martin's Memorial Church, Stornoway and chair of the Church Action Forum. His theme was 'Don't just survive-thrive!' He used the example of people within his congregation who were not keen on some aspects of worship. They cited themselves as traditionalists and longed for a church as it was 50 or 60 years ago. He pointed out that he too is a traditionalist, however his hope is to restore the spirit and action of the church to how it was 2000 years ago! He points out that the book which describes the early church is not called the book of thoughts or of theology, but the book of Acts. These are the acts of people and the spirit and the church has always been and will always be remembered by its acts.

Referring to Acts 11:19-21 he reminded presbytery that the Gospel isn't just for those who sit in the church on a Sunday morning but to everyone, especially those who do not fit into what is often considered the 'normal' mould.

There followed a presentation on how the church can set out the services it provides within and for the community alongside how it can project itself. Of particular note- along with the importance of social media- was the impact that a set of well positioned church gates can have as a means of communicating to passers-by!

The afternoon session dealt with business and the agenda is attached in the appendix. Kirk Session's attention is particularly drawn to the following points within reports:

SAFEGUARDING COMMITTEE

Somewhat bemused she asked her clerical friend what the problem was. "Well," said the minister, "I'm not very happy with how he behaves at the end of the services. Over the last few Sundays I have noticed that, after he has played an appropriate tune while I make my way out to the front door, he has started indulging in playing some rather beautiful classical pieces on the organ".

"What's wrong with that?" the session clerk asked.

"What is wrong with that," the minister replied, "is that the congregation don't leave. They just sit in their seats listening to him until he has finished. Meanwhile, I'm standing out the front in the freezing cold, waiting to shake the congregation's hands on their way out. It all came to a head last Sunday morning. The Masons at Upper Annandale Parish Church

The first joint ceremony between, the then, St. Andrew's Church and the masons was on 9th August 1885 when Bro. Frederick Ernest Villiers of Closeburn, the Provincial Grand Master of Dumfriesshire laid the foundation stone in the northeast corner with full masonic ritual to a large crowd.

On 6th May, 1886 Lodge Hartfell, No. 728 was started in Moffat. This occurred midway between the laying of the foundation stone and the completion and first service in St. Andrew's on Friday 23rd September, 1887.

Over the passing years there were numerous church services including masonic funeral services, unfortunately these are only mentioned in the Lodge minutes, but the alongside photograph dated 1916 - 1918 shows members of the Lodge outside St. Andrew's obviously after a Divine Service.





On 6th September, 2018 Lodge Hartfell held its first meeting in the church hall at St. Andrew's Church and still holds it's meetings there. On Sunday 9th January, 2022 to cement the union between the church and the masons, Rev. Elsie Macrae and the Worship Master of Lodge Hartfell planted a rowan tree in the grounds of St. Andrew's to celebrate the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

On the 10th September, 2023 the Masonic Order of Knights Templar held its first Divine Service in now, the Upper Annandale Parish Church. The Grand Master of the Order gave the prayer of Dedication and Intercession and at the completion of the service refreshments were supplied for all who had attended, and a cheque was presented to Rev. Elsie. It was quite a



spectacle and was thoroughly enjoyed by all and if you missed it this year it is intended to hold it again next year at a similar time.

On 8th October Bill Wells, a mason of several Orders, raised over £1,800 on behalf of Lodge Hartfell, all Royal Arch masons and Knights Templar masons for C.H.A.S. (Children's Hospices Across Scotland) which will be presented to them at Rachel House, Kinross (one of their hospices) on 24th November.

On 3rd November the Provincial Royal Arch Chapter of Dumfriesshire held a ceilidh in Lockerbie and a further cheque for £500 was handed to a representative of C.H.A.S.

The representatives of the masons, Royal Arch and Knights Templar are in discussion with Rev. Elsie regarding the possibility of being present wearing their regalia at one of the Christmas services.

Long may this union between the masons and Upper Annandale parish Church continue.

One final thing for those who are not aware, is that no masonic meeting can take place unless the open bible is in place.
